With more construction and some trime constraints, the decision was made to partner with the Wisconsin Timber Rattlers for this year's event. Similar to last year, we will be working around the Timber Rattler's schedule with the Roadeo competition taking place on August 16-17, 2023. Inflation has been on the rise, but we are happy to announce that we are keeping prices fixed for this year including our \$40 driver competition fee which includes an official Roadeo hat, t-shirt, and lunch. Winter Road Maintenance training will move to the Fall APWA Conference for 2023.

Wisconsin Chapter Recognizes Outstanding Public Works Projects

City of New Richmond

Nature-Doar Trail Enhancement

s the City of New Richmond expanded and experienced significant growth in recent years, the municipality wanted to connect the new developments with existing trails and meet the increasing demand in the community for outdoor recreation opportunities and chances to connect with nature. The project consisted of a 2,680 lineal foot recreation trail connecting two nature areas commencing at the Doar Prairie Restoration Park area and ending at the Nature Center Park area. The trail is an 8 -foot wide bituminous trail and includes a river crossing as well as a highway underpass crossing, providing a new, safe connection for people walking, biking, rolling, and



scooting. The design and construction of the Nature-Doar Trail fulfills several goals for the City in terms of multimodal connectivity, outdoor recreation, and supporting future development and growth. It was a complex process to make this project a reality, starting with the conceptual design to successfully receive grant funding.

City of Eau Claire

Chicago Northwestern Chippewa River Bridge

he Chicago Northwestern Chippewa River Bridge, more familiarly known simply as "The High Bridge," was abandoned by the railroad in 1992, and ownership was transferred to the city in 2007 for \$1. The bridge is a vital bicycle and pedestrian only connection across the Chippewa River since its abandonment. Its historical significance has made the High Bridge a symbol of the City of Eau Claire and a key focal point as one of the most photographed bridges in the region. A bridge failure presented the city with an unanticipated multimillion-dollar project to stabilize the bridge, rehabilitate the piers, and repair the abutments. It was a significant cost. The first item considered for the project was whether to remove the bridge and construct a new bridge crossing or rehabilitate the existing bridge if possible. A crossing of the river was



needed, so not having a bridge was not an acceptable option. The bridge is approximately 898 feet long, including two 80-foot double intersecting Warren deck trusses at the approaches and four 180-foot main spans are believed to be the only quintuple intersecting lattice deck trusses in the nation. The city staff, design consultants, and contractors recognized that they were racing against the clock in hopes of saving the bridge before it failed further. Protecting the short-and long-term health of the Chippewa River and its fisheries was of paramount importance. Work continued through the sometimes-brutal northern Wisconsin winter, allowing for an only nine-month construction impact to the public use of this beloved bridge. Today, the bridge is back in use!

City of Madison Garver Path Trail Enhancement

he City of Madison recently completed a \$3 million trail enhancement that adds a pedestrian friendly, shared-use path connection to the greater trail system. The extended connectivity was intended to provide access to neighborhoods, commercial areas, downtown, and other destinations throughout the region, and help the city uphold its status as one of the top bike friendly communities in the US. Garver Path is a mile-long connector trail that now links the community to the Capital City Trail, a popular recreational pathway for walking, running, and biking, and the



greater trail system. The project was particularly complicated since much of the area is wet and a mapped floodplain according to the FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM). The completion of this project enhances and extends the area's thriving multi-modal network by improving mobility, connectivity, and safety while sustainably preserving the natural elements the community treasures. Congratulations to the City of Madison for the Project of the Year Award in the category of Transportation.

City of Onalaska Main Street & Green Coulee Roundabout

he City of Onalaska had a major intersection safety concern that demanded action. Green Coulee Road, a critical access point connecting the city of Onalaska and the greater Onalaska-La Crosse metropolitan area, intersects with East Main Street, itself, a heavily used route that combined - led to impatient drivers, risky decision making, and several crashes over the years, some of which were severe. The complex intersection



improvement project led to the introduction of a multi-lane roundabout that improves traffic operations for drivers on both roads. The new roundabout improves safety and efficiency at this busy regional intersection, slowing vehicular speeds, reducing vehicle emissions, implementing accessible two-stage crossings for pedestrians, and delivering intuitive, secure access to businesses throughout.

City of Brookfield Calhoun Road Urban Reconstruction

or the City of Brookfield, Calhoun Road serves as an important corridor for residents, businesses, and emergency services in the heart of Brookfield. The purpose of this two-mile urban reconstruction project was to address poor pavement conditions, traffic demand and capacity, safety, and deficient drainage. and to provide for continuous bicycle and pedestrian facilities. This reconstruction project expanded a two-mile section of Calhoun Road from North Avenue to Capitol Drive to a fourlane divided roadway to provide vital continuity for the traveling public including bicyclists and pedestrians. The City of Brookfield worked closely with their consultant, WisDOT, and numerous other stakehold-



ers to successfully complete one of the largest and most complex WisDOT Local Program projects in Wisconsin. Challenges included:

- Butting up against residences and businesses, as well as a school and several religious centers.
- Two streams, a pond, two railroad crossings, four-teen intersections, and a large wetland presented unique challenges.
- Extensive public involvement. Completion of this corridor provided vital continuity for the traveling public, as well as the City's emergency services, as the police station and three fire stations are located on Calhoun Road.≰




